PIONEER DEAD

Lieutenant Frederick Schmidt Passes Away at Ripe Old Age—Was in the Mexican War.

Lieutenant Frederick Schmitt died Saturday morning at 5 o'clock at his late residence on West North street. He was born November 28, 1822, at Harten, Elsass-Lothringen, Germany. He came to this country with his parents in 1829. They settled at Pottsville, Pa.; a few years later they removed to Columbus, Ohio.

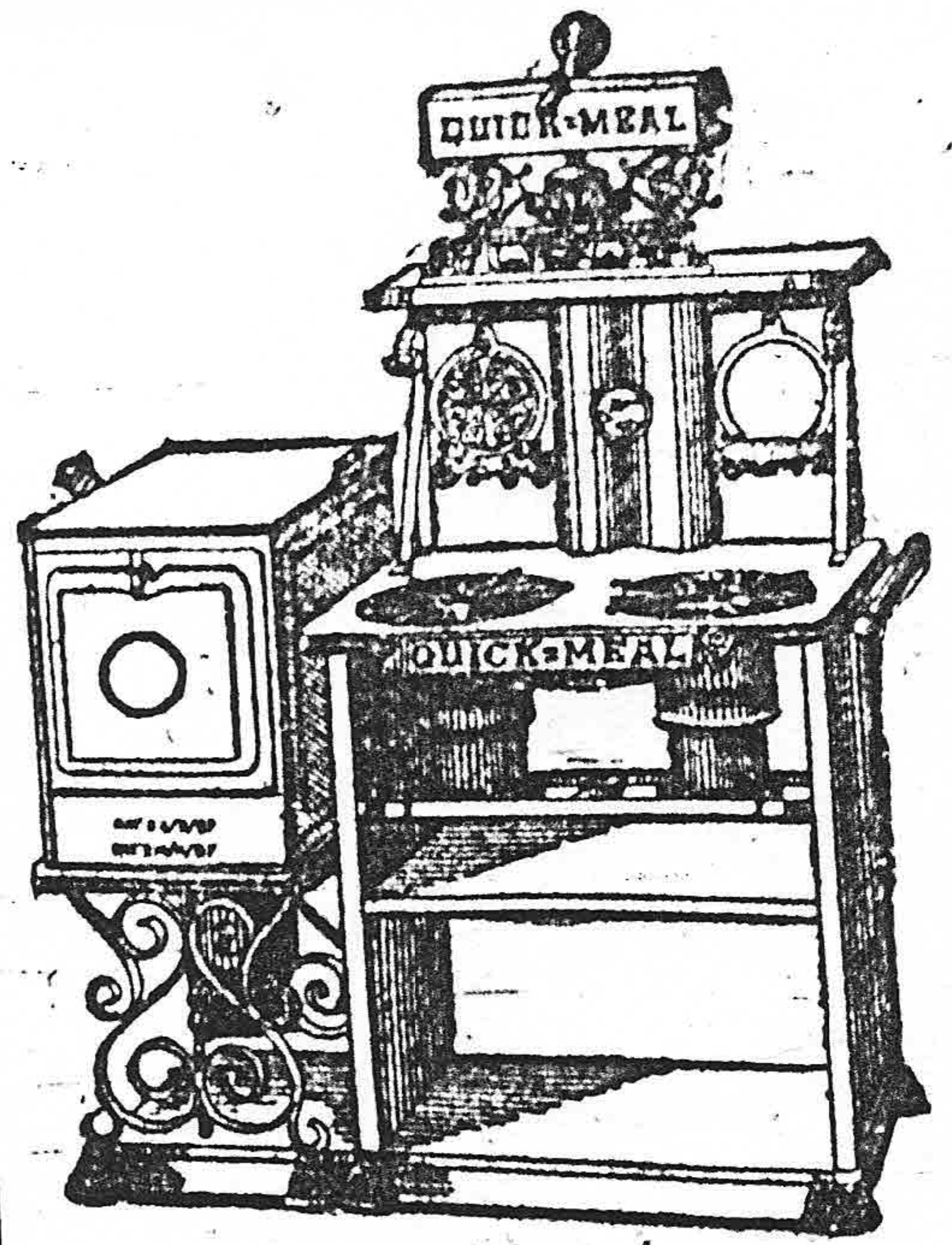
The deceased worked on the National pike, which was then in course of construction by the government. When the Mexican war broke out a Gemran company was organized at Columbus, Ohio, by Captain Dr. Zerkle, who appointed him lieutenant of his company. He took active part in two battles.

Lieutenant Schmitt was married to Catherine Beer of Columbus, Ohio, in 1850. Three children born of this marriage, namely, Franz Frederick Schmitt, Elenora Gentener and Margareta Mangold, survive; also 19 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. Mrs. Schmitt died November 1, 1860.

In 1852 he came to Springfield and on the 29th of December, 1863, he married Barbara Histner, who survives him. He was a carpenter and contractor by trade, and built many houses in this city and helped to build the Lagonda shops. He was a member of the I. O. O. F. lodge. Prof. Bleile of the O. S. U. is a nephew of the deceased.

The funeral will take place Tuesday at 2 p. m. at St. John's Lutheran church. Interment at Ferncliff cemetery.
